**SUBJECT: REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL (RFP) No. 386-06-003;
Energy Conservation and Commercialization (ECO) Project, Phase-III (ECO III),
USAID/India**

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, the US Agency for International Development in New Delhi, India (USAID/India) is issuing this Solicitation (RFP) in accordance with U.S. Government Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Part 15 for management support service contract for qualified organizations interested in providing the services to implement the program as fully described in the attached solicitation.

The purpose of this solicitation is to select a firm to manage and coordinate the provision of expert technical assistance, training and grants to initiate and complete a set of selected activities on behalf of USAID/India for its Energy Conservation and Commercialization (ECO) Project, Phase-III.

In order to be eligible an offeror must be a firm that perform project management services as a significant portion of its business; must be incorporated and have its corporate headquarters in U.S., or its overseas possessions or territory; must have paid corporate franchise and employment taxes in the country where its headquarter office is located for a minimum of two years and shall have filed corporate and income tax declarations for a minimum of two corporate years, having paid any applicable taxes determined to be due as a result of such filings; and employ U.S. citizens or permanent U.S. residence in the majority of key management positions.

USAID anticipates awarding one contract this solicitation for an estimated maximum total value of no more than US\$ 8,500,000 over a maximum five year period, subject exercising all option periods and to availability of funds. Revealing the cost range for the contract does not mean that Offerors should necessarily strive to meet the maximum amount. The Offeror must propose costs that it believes are realistic and reasonable for the work. Cost proposals shall be evaluated as part of a best value determination for contract award. Please note that the U.S. Government may award this contract without discussions and as such initial proposals should represent the best possible and most competitive terms available.
