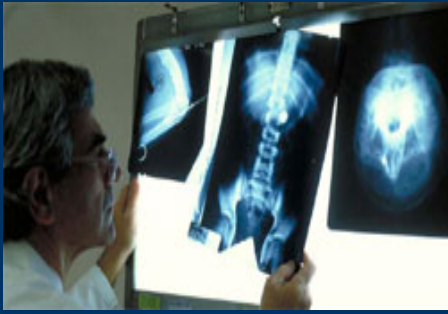

Minutes from the CFBCI Conference Call with USAID Limited Excess Property Program Staff

Through the Limited Excess Property Program (LEPP), Private Voluntary Organizations (PVOs) can acquire U.S. government excess property for use in their programs and projects overseas. Through LEPP, USAID makes it possible for millions of dollars of excess property to be utilized in dozens of developing countries.

On May 5, 2009, the CFBCI hosted a conference call with USAID LEPP staff.

An excerpt from the call:

“LEPP is a program that allows NGOs to acquire U.S. government excess property for use in their programs and projects overseas. This property can include computers, medical supplies, vehicles, boats, trailers, furniture, etc... LEPP has had \$30 million in donations go to FBCOs in the last year. We have also donated to the countries through the USAID missions. For example, we donated flu vaccine to El Salvador through the USAID mission. The Center for Disease Control had flu vaccine to donate and came to me. USAID, CDC and GSA worked together to donate over \$1 million to El Salvador in flu vaccine. We are also currently working to donate flu vaccine to Mexico for the current crisis,” Welford Walker, USAID/LEPP, Excess Property Coordinator.

What is Distinctive About Faith-Based Organizations?

INTRAC
International NGO Training and Research Centre

INTRAC is a non-profit organization working in the international development and relief sector. They support non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and civil society organizations (CSOs) around the world by helping to explore policy issues, and by strengthening management and organizational effectiveness.

What is Distinctive About FBOs? How European FBOs define and operationalise their faith (Praxis Paper 22)

This paper is the first step in an INTRAC applied research programme to explore how European NGOs define and operationalise their faith.

Faith-based organizations (FBOs) have historically been in the forefront of service delivery and social movements in development, but have been disregarded by donors for decades. Religion has largely been viewed as anti-developmental. To survive in such a secular climate, many FBOs in Europe have downplayed their faith identity. But as the aid climate changes from 'estrangement' to 'engagement' with faith, so FBOs are reassessing what their faith identity means to them and how it influences their work.

The paper first analyses the changing context of faith in development. It observes that the old certainties of the twentieth century and neat separation between faith and development breaking down. Instead of the predicted decline in religion, in most parts of the developing world, it is increasing.

Many FBOs in Europe, particularly Christian ones, have been reticent to articulate too close a connection to their faith identity. But as donors are

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asking agencies to clarify their value added, some FBOs are turning to their faith based and their partnerships with other FBOs. The paper identifies ten areas of organizational life where faith can make a significant difference to an FBO.

Drawing on these areas, the paper concludes that European FBOs and donors need better understanding of the particular characteristics of FBOs in order to work effectively in partnership with them. Sensitive and inclusive clarification of faith by European FBOs will be beneficial for their long-term organizational performance. It will need conscious, visionary, and careful management to bring greater congruence between organizational beliefs and actions.

Funding Opportunities Glossary:

Annual Program Statement (APS)-

- An APS is used to generate competition for activities that are complementary to USAID's strategic objectives. They originate from USAID offices and missions around the world and solicit creative approaches and programs that will accomplish defined objectives.

Request for Applications (RFA)-

- RFAs invite interested parties to submit competitive applications for USAID assistance, explaining what the application should contain, how it should be written, and the evaluation criteria to be used.

USAID - The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) Bureau for Global Health, Office of Health, Infectious Disease and Nutrition (GH/HIDN) is seeking applications from U.S. Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and Non-U.S. Non-Governmental Organizations (see Section III.B, Eligible Countries) engaged in international health and development, to implement activities under the Long-Lasting Insecticide Treated Net (LLIN) RFA. The activity outlined in this [RFA](#) is aligned with USAID's Foreign Assistance Framework and will contribute to the Health Program Area of the Investing in People Objective. As such, the project in its entirety will support the Malaria Program Element, Sub-Element: 3.1.3.2, "Insecticide-Treated Nets to Prevent Malaria". It is anticipated that PMI-designated priority countries will be a significant source of mission buy-in and funding for this agreement. However, any USAID operating unit (field missions, bureaus, etc) with malaria control programs will be encouraged to participate in this activity. The new award will build on previous and on-going USG investments, including those made under the PMI, the NetMark Project, as well as investments by other partners. The agreement will be a five-year competitively awarded Cooperative Agreement to begin in FY 2009. The project will be funded with a combination of core and field support funding. This agreement will be authorized to accept all types of USAID funding as long as the use is consistent with the scope of this award and USAID's malaria control objectives. USAID - The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) Bureau for Global Health, Office of Health, Infectious Disease and Nutrition (GH/HIDN) is seeking applications from eligible U.S. organizations, as described in Section III of this RFA, to implement activities under PREPARE – Pandemic Preparedness Activity. This coordinated and comprehensive program is designed to minimize the impact of specific newly emergent diseases of animal origin, which pose a significant threat to human health and development. This program must be managed by the USAID Avian and Pandemic Influenza Unit. USAID will work closely with international, host governments, USG, and private sector entities to coordinate activities and ensure that USAID's involvement is consistent with that of the global health community. USAID/Almaty - The purpose of this notice to solicit an application for a three year program that will provide region-wide legal and regulatory support for civil society organizations (CSOs) in Central Asia. Specifically, USAID is seeking assistance to support the following goals: • Support the development/implementation of enabling CSO legislation and avoid passage of restrictive legislation • Increase the capacity of indigenous lawyers to assist CSOs • Promote public discussion of legal and policy issues related to civil society and CSOs. USAID/Monrovia - The purpose of this program description (PD) is to define the parameters of a five year, election support program for USAID/Liberia. The objective is to provide timely support through technical assistance and some material support to assist Liberia's National Elections Commission (NEC) to conduct specific electoral exercises that are vital to the continued democratic transition underway in Liberia. These exercises include constituency boundary delimitation, design a revised voter registration system, holding a national referendum to amend the Constitution, and support holding local elections. In addition to these exercises, the program description also calls for capacity building training for the entire NEC, including for temporary staff hired to assist with the conduct of electoral events, such as by-elections, as needed. Finally, the PD requires a program of support to the NEC for nationwide civic and voter education to inform and sensitize Liberians about some important new changes in the election landscape as a result of these exercises. USAID/Addis Ababa - USAID/Ethiopia Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Program will operate within the Investing in People objective. The Program will contribute to improving health by increasing access to safe drinking water and improving sanitation and hygiene practices, in accordance with USAID guidance on the use of Global Health/Child Survival Funds. This new WASH Program will be a three year program, depending on performance and availability of funding. The total three year cost of the program is estimated at \$4,000,000. To implement the key components of this project, the Recipient will need to work in close partnership with the Government of Ghana, other USAID implementing partners, non-governmental organizations, community and elected leaders, faith-based organizations, and various other local partners. USAID/Nairobi - The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) is seeking applications for an Assistance Agreement for funding a program for the implementation of “the Support Services for Vulnerable Populations” Program in Rwanda. The main objective is to reduce the risk and impact of HIV/AIDS and other health conditions on most vulnerable populations in Rwanda, especially people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA), orphans and vulnerable children (OVC) and their families. USAID/Nairobi – Democratic Republic of Congo’s (DRC) program to respond to and prevent sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) is a critical element of the U.S. Government’s foreign policy goal in the DRC to support the emergence of a stable, democratic Congo that is at peace with its neighbors and provides for the basic needs of its citizens. Under that rubric, USAID supports programs to protect vulnerable populations from physical violence and abuse and assist the DRC in its stabilization and gradual transition from a post-conflict country to a developing one. Overseas Processing Entity (OPE)-

An entity funded by the Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration's (PRM's) Admissions Office to prepare the paperwork

Bureau Of Educational and Cultural Affairs The Office of Citizen Exchanges, Youth Programs Division, of the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) announces an open competition for the Youth Ambassadors Program with Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Guyana, Mexico, Paraguay, Peru, Suriname, Uruguay, Venezuela, and the United States. Public and private non-profit organizations meeting the provisions described in Internal Revenue Code section 26 USC 501(c)(3) may submit proposals to recruit and select youth and adult participants and to provide the participants with three week exchanges focused on civic education, community service, and leadership along with follow-on projects in their home communities. For planning purposes, it is anticipated that exchange delegations will travel from all 13 countries to the United States, and U.S. exchange delegations will travel to six South American countries. Investigators continue to find mass graves and razed villages where scores of dead bodies are strewn about, such as in the North Kivu village of Kiwanja in November 2008. Fighting in eastern Congo continues, along with the rape and killing of significant numbers of civilians by various parties to the conflict, all of whom enjoy impunity. Skeletal and other remains of the victims of killings and disappearances have not been identified, due in part to the high cost of DNA extraction and analysis, the extremely limited resources and capacity of local authorities, and a weak judiciary. Major technological improvements since 2001 have increased the feasibility and cost-effectiveness of processing large amounts of genetic material. The use of forensic-genetic techniques to help police and Congolese NGOs immediately gather and preserve evidence of rape and identify the physical remains of murder victims could begin the process of bringing about closure for victims' families and provide physical evidence for developing legal actions against alleged perpetrators, thereby supporting respect for the rule of law, reconciliation for past crimes, and justice for society as a whole. Proposals will outline program concepts and capacity to manage projects that will: 1) support the collection and preservation of rape evidence and/or 2) facilitate the identification of remains. East Asia and the Pacific: Vietnam Background: For the past decade, Vietnam has systematically attempted to locate and identify their dead and missing in action from past conflicts. While the focus has been on bringing home those lost in Cambodia and Laos, efforts have also occurred in Vietnam, on an ad hoc basis. Vietnam has a nascent capacity to locate, excavate, and identify remains, developed through exposure to U.S. excavation and identification techniques during multiple, annual combined U.S./Vietnam MIA recovery operations involving the U.S. Joint Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Command (JPAC). But Vietnam's capacity to account for its own missing, including from their conflict with the United States, remains weak. While the exact number of successful excavations by Vietnam is unknown, tens of thousands of sets of remains have been interned in cemeteries. Most remain unidentified unless they were recovered with identification documents. Existing Vietnamese excavation teams are comprised mainly of military personnel, with limited or no anthropologists or archeologists accompanying them. The primary forensics office, The People's Army of Vietnam Pathology Institute, recently developed a limited DNA identification capability in an attempt to broaden and advance its identification procedures. Identifying the dead and missing in action from past conflicts facilitates closure for the families, contributes to Vietnam's ability to put its painful past to rest and, through the goodwill it creates, may help advance effort to fully account for America's remaining missing military personnel.
