STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

I thank the Senate for the strong, bipartisan vote today to pass important, life-saving legislation reauthorizing the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR). I appreciate the efforts of Majority Leader Reid, Senator Biden and Senator Lugar, and all other Senators from both sides of the aisle who came together today to ensure that America's generosity in battling HIV/AIDS, malaria, and other diseases around the globe will continue into the future.

consistent with the program's successful founding principles.

When we launched this program in 2003, about 50,000 people in Sub-Saharan Africa were receiving antiretroviral treatment for HIV/AIDS. Today, PEPFAR supports life-saving anti-retroviral treatment for more than 1.5 million people around the world. PEPFAR has also supported treatment and prevention programs that have helped over 100,000 positive women give birth to nearly 200,000 infants who are HIV-free. PEPFAR is the largest international initiative in history to fight a single disease.

Traveling in Africa earlier this year, Laura and I had our most recent opportunity to witness the effectiveness of this program. We were honored to see the doctors, nurses and caregivers of all faiths working to save the lives of their fellow citizens. And we met the patients, including many children, who understand and appreciate the generosity of those who support them.

With passage of today's bill we are one step closer to ensuring that this excellent program continues to help those in need. I encourage the full Congress to move quickly to send me final legislation that I can sign.

NATIONAL LANGUAGE SERVICE CORPS

The [National Language Service Corps \(NLSC\)](#) “offers individuals with language expertise the opportunity to help their neighbors and fellow citizens by participating in national and state emergency preparedness efforts, particularly in times of emergency or crisis when their expertise can truly make a difference.”

The NLSC is comprised of “volunteers with certified expertise in languages important to the security and welfare of the United States willing to serve as on-call Federal employees (when the NLSC becomes operational), using their diverse language skills across local, state, and federal agencies. The opportunities for service include emergency relief as well as service in support of domestic and international crises—wherever language skills are needed. The NLSC strives to connect service minded individuals who embrace the power of communication and ultimately, envision helping to create a greater human good.

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"The NLSC began in 2005 as a result of a Congressional charge to the National Security Education Program (NSEP) to explore a program that provides certified language skills in times of national emergencies. Fully implemented, NLSC is expected to include more than 30,000 members in 150 languages." The initial pilot program is currently seeking speakers of eight languages: Mandarin, Hausa, Somali, Hindi, Swahili, Vietnamese, Russian, and Indonesian."

Transparency International (TI), an NGO dedicated to eradicating corruption, mobilizes a world coalition of leaders from government, civil society, business, and the media to generate dialogue and promote transparency in these critical sectors. Since its founding in 1993, TI has become a world leader in establishing an anti-corruption movement.

Over one billion people worldwide have no guaranteed access to water, and over two billion are living without basic sanitation, thus creating global water crisis severely hindering development. According to Transparency International, internal corruption remains the primary source for barriers to water access for much of the world's poorest populations. On June 25, TI released the 2008 Global Corruption Report: Corruption in the Water Sector, which tracks the sources of corruption and the impact it has on various divisions of the water sector.

The report covers a wide range of issues concerning water management and distribution, including "petty bribery, kickbacks, delivery to procurement-related looting of irrigation and hydropower funds; from covering up industrial pollution to manipulation of water management and allocation policies."

Nonetheless, as the Global Corruption Report shows, taking action against corruption in the water sector is both possible and feasible: precisely the work for which Transparency International dedicates itself. Key recommendations include:

- Establish transparency and participation as guiding principles for all aspects of water governance: From transparent budgeting and participatory policy-making to public mapping of water pollution, public access to projects and access to contract terms and performance reports, transparency and participation strengthen integrity in water governance, but need to be adopted globally.
- Strengthen regulatory oversight: Government and the public sector continue to play the most prominent role in water governance and should establish effective regulatory oversight, whether for the environment, water supply, sanitation, agriculture or energy. Institutional reform and capacity-building are essential to bring oversight of water up to the standards already achieved in other sectors .
- Ensure fair competition and accountable implementation of water projects: All stakeholders have a role to play. Contracts should incorporate anti-corruption measures. Governments and contractors can enter into agreements for fair public procurement. Lenders and donors must strengthen anti-bribery provisions in their due diligence requirements.

Hydropower constitutes one sixth of the world's electric power, making water a critical sector of interest in the debate about sustainable energy use. "As well as undermining the long term viability of dam projects, the costs of corruption are considerable for people and the environment. With up to 80 million people displaced by dams, the environmental impacts of hydropower are significant."

Hussein Ibrahim walked solemnly past tidy rows of bright green cabbages, vines bursting with tomatoes and tomatoes weighed down with plump avocados. This modern, thriving farm — a rarity in drought-ravaged Ethiopia — fills him with envy. Like so many other farmers across the Horn of Africa, he has no hope for his own crops this year.

"We are behind all the other people in the world," said Hussein, who tends his land in southern Ethiopia the way his ancestors did hundreds of years ago — with rain, if it comes; and oxen, as long as they're healthy.

To break out of endless cycles of drought, poverty and hunger, experts say, Africa desperately needs to modernize its old farming techniques. But the vast sums in foreign aid to Africa go toward feeding the hungry, and very little toward improving farming so that Africans will cease to depend on handouts.

It isn't impossible. A decade ago, a "green revolution" helped millions of farmers in Asia and Latin America end their dependence on poverty with basic innovations such as fertilizer, improved irrigation and hybrid seeds.

But Africa's farms, which employ more than half the labor force, remain one-fourth as productive as their counterparts around the world.

Ethiopia drew international attention in 1984 when a famine compounded by communist policies killed 1 million people. The country is now gripped by drought that has left 4.6 million people in need of emergency food shipments.

Drought is especially bad for Ethiopia because farming employs more than 80 percent of Ethiopians and accounts for 80 percent of all domestic production and 85 percent of exports.

Yet it's not that Ethiopia is incapable of growing food, as this experimental farm 100 miles southwest of Addis Ababa demonstrates. It just needs the right tools.

The farm, part of a government-run research center, beats the drought with smart irrigation systems, higher-yield seeds, and fertilizer and pesticides correctly applied.

Hussein and dozens of other farmers were invited to the farm in late June to learn about modern agricultural

The 640-acre center employs nearly 350 workers, nearly 60 of whom hold advanced degrees in agriculture. It was founded in 1969 in the dying days of Ethiopia's monarchy, survived a decade of Marxist dictatorship, famine and wars, and has since pointed the way to food independence.

But all it can do is point. It costs the Ethiopian government about \$1.1 million a year to run the farm. The average Ethiopian worker farms two acres, has little education and earns about \$800 a year.

Also on the visit to the center was Mitike Abebe, who farms wheat, barley, lentils and other crops in southern Ethiopia. She depends entirely on rainfall, sturdy oxen, and her overworked soil.

"We don't want food aid," she said. "We need tractors, we need seeds, we need farm machinery."

There's aid aplenty — Ethiopia alone got \$1.95 billion in 2006 — but Africa-wide, less than 5 percent of it goes toward the sort of things Mitike needs.

The United States, Ethiopia's largest donor, this year gave it more than \$570 million, but just over 1 percent of that aid is going toward developing agriculture.

In 2004, African nations agreed to set aside 10 percent of their national budgets for agricultural development. By 2006, they exceeded that promise, with 16 percent of its \$3.4 billion budget. But experts say it is simply not enough for a continent dependent on the land.

According to the U.N., nearly two-thirds of Africa's agricultural land has been degraded by erosion and misuse. In Ethiopia, where bad farming practices have led to massive erosion, 85 percent of land is damaged.

"We've under-invested, and everybody appreciates this now," said Glenn Anders, who heads the American aid group Concern Worldwide. "Particularly in Africa, for the last few decades, maybe more."

The continent's other needs often offer a quicker fix for donors, he said.

"You give a kid an immunization and that kid's better. Agriculture's much more indirect than that and also requires more time. It's not a quick fix at all."
