DEFINITIONS


- A partnership is a collaboration that leverages the skills, assets, resources and technologies of USAID and its partners from the public, private, academic, and nonprofit sectors.
- An award is an instrument the Agency uses to partner with an organization.
- A **solicitation or notice of funding opportunity** is a process the Agency uses to seek proposals, applications, or information from potential partners.
- A Mission is a USAID overseas operating unit that manages programming in a country or region.
- A **Bureau** is a USAID operating unit that manages a major global role or function.
- Assistance is an award of funds to a recipient to achieve a public good.
- Acquisition is USAID's procurement of good and services from a contractor.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT FOR USAID TO PARTNER?

USAID Mission:

The U.S. Agency for International Development leads the U.S. Government's international development and disaster assistance through partnerships and investments that save lives, reduce poverty, strengthen democratic governance, and help people emerge from humanitarian crises and progress beyond assistance.

PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES

STEP 1



Start by reviewing the Agency's **Strategy and Planning** site.

Look for information that helps you understand Agency activities and priorities in the countries where you hope to work:

- **Mission websites** provide information about USAID history and current activities in each country.
- **Country Development Cooperation Strategies** (CDCSs) outline which technical sectors Missions have prioritized.
- **USAID's "What We Do" web page** provides links to help you research policies, strategies, and visions for the technical sectors relevant to your organization.

USAID PLANNING CYCLE

At any given time, USAID is working on programming across <u>four</u> different fiscal years.

CHECK THE BUSINESS FORECAST

STEP 2



The USAID Business Forecast is a real-time, searchable database of funding opportunities in the planning stages.

- Check this database at least monthly.
- Follow specific funding opportunities for changes or updates.
- Begin making plans to respond to a funding opportunity when it opens.

RESEARCH ROLLING FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

STEP 3



A "rolling" funding opportunity has an ongoing application deadline and focuses on broad areas of interest.

There are two common types of rolling funding opportunities:

- Annual Program Statements (APSs) invite concept papers on a broad topic;
- **Broad Agency Announcements** (BAAs) seek innovative ideas in response to a particular challenge or need.

TRACK OPEN FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

STEP 4




"Open" funding opportunities usually have shorter response turnaround times and are usually more narrowly defined.

These typically take two forms:

- USAID announces **acquisition opportunities** for contracts at <u>beta.SAM.gov</u>. These announcements are called Requests for Proposals (RFPs).
- The Agency announces assistance opportunities for grants and cooperative agreements at <u>Grants.gov</u>. These announcements are called a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) or Requests for Applications (RFAs).

COLLABORATIVE APPROACHES

Through a process called co-creation, USAID brings together potential partners to collaborate on solutions to development problems.

USAID encourages partnership in two common ways:

- Requests for information and market research activities are intended to gather ideas from organizations to help the Agency plan its activities.
- **Stakeholder consultations** bring together organizations with relevant knowledge for discussions that can inform USAID's plans.

You can use these opportunities to interact with USAID, deepen your understanding of the Agency's work, and demonstrate your organization's knowledge and capacity.

USAID AND SMALL BUSINESSES

USAID's Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) is dedicated to promoting the use of U.S. small businesses in procurement.

This office:

- Negotiates small-business funding goals with the U.S. Small Business Administration;
- Works with USAID Bureaus, independent offices, and Missions to negotiate individual small-business goals.

THE "GO/NO-GO" DECISION

To assess whether you should pursue a funding opportunity, consider this:

- It takes time, effort, and resources to develop a proposal or application.
- Your efforts may require diverting resources from other priorities.
- Funding opportunities are highly competitive.



- Does your organization have the capacity to successfully implement the award?
- Does your organization have the ability to submit required documents by the deadline?
- How competitive will your organization be compared to other organizations?

Does your organization have the capacity to successfully implement the award?

Do you have the right technical expertise?

Have you worked in the geographic area?

 Do you have the experience and systems to implement the Activity at the scale envisioned in the announcement for the funding opportunity?



- Does your organization have the ability to submit required documents by the deadline?
 - Time and ability to do assessments or research;
 - Experts available to ensure technical soundness;
 - Strong writer to create proposal or application narrative;
 - Finance staff who are able to research costs and develop the budget?



How prepared is your organization to meet and maintain compliance requirements?

- Is your organization registered to work with the U.S. Government?
- Do you have a sound plan for risk management and financial reporting?
- Are you familiar with the standard provisions that accompany USAID funding?



SUBMISSION LOGISTICS

While you are deciding whether to respond to a funding opportunity, keep these things in mind about the process:

- Most funding opportunities have an "open question period" when you may send questions to USAID.
- Take time during this open question period to clarify details and help inform your "go/no-go" decision.
- Note that when a funding opportunity is active, USAID staff are not allowed to discuss it directly with potential partners.

A "GO" DECISION

The ideal "go" decision is one where responding to a funding opportunity has value, even if your proposal or application does not win.

Going through the experience gives you the opportunity to:

- Learn about the process and better prepare for future opportunities;
- Present your organization and your ideas to USAID;
- Gain valuable feedback so you can be more competitive in the future.





The purpose of Enhancing WASH is to increase access to sustainable water, sanitation and hygiene services to targeted districts in Northern Ghana. This activity will strengthen governance and finance for WASH services; contribute to expansion of WASH services and adoption of WASH services to households, communities and health facilities; improve engagement with the private sector and support Ghana's investment in the WASH sector. The program will focus on systems strengthening through a facilitative approach by deepening partnerships with GoG, MMDAs, the private sector and CSOs. The activity will support Ghana's journey to self-reliance and the Ghana Beyond Aid agenda by supporting the GOG to improve its capacity to sustainably deliver essential WASH services during the COVID-19 pandemic response and WASH in health facilities.



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


Feed the Future Priority Country





PATHWAYS TO PARTNERSHIP

USAID offers different ways for potential partners to collaborate on development solutions.

Organizations should explore different funding opportunities that fit their needs and USAID's strategies and goals.

While some opportunities lead to funded awards, others provide partners the chance to build relationships with USAID around shared goals.



KEY POINTS

- USAID relies on partnerships with a variety of organizations to achieve its goals.
- Potential partners follow four steps to explore funding opportunities to partner with USAID:
 - 1. Learn about Agency priorities and strategies;
 - 2. Follow the Business Forecast;
 - 3. Explore "rolling" funding opportunities;
 - 4. Track "open" opportunities.
- It is important to begin exploring funding opportunities 6 to 12 months before you plan to respond.
- Smaller and newer organizations can learn about USAID programming by partnering with larger, more experienced partners.
- You and your team will find many different pathways to partnership with the Agency.
