BANGLADESH: GOOD FOR THE COMMUNITY, GOOD FOR THE CLIMATE

In the Cox's Bazar district of Bangladesh communities are facing a twofold challenge: the impact on livelihoods from accommodating one million Rohingya refugees, and the impacts of climate change, including water scarcity and flooding, which in turn impact agriculture. To address both challenges, community members engaged in training focused on year-round, high-yield, and climate-smart vegetable cultivation. From trellises to sandbags, the community members have adopted these strategies to utilize the limited land more efficiently and reduce flood risk. The benefits are already evident within the community, as community members are not only growing more food for their own consumption, but they are also able to sell the surplus harvest.

CHAMPIONING LOCALLY LED DEVELOPMENT: PATRICK ROBISON

In Bosnia and Herzegovina, USAID's Local Works program is building local systems and strengthening relationships between local and national organizations, the government, and the private sector to better serve communities across the country. To accomplish this, the Mission has taken a unique approach: they have a broad portfolio of activities, ranging from capacity development for local organizations, to establishing local philanthropy.

Patrick Robison, the Director of USAID/Bosnia and Herzegovina's Office of Acquisition and Assistance, explains that this is a set of "interlocking pieces to create a whole program-the end result is that we are utilizing all of these pieces to the larger locally led development (LLD) puzzle that will leave behind an ecosystem for LLD."

"We're advocating at multiple levels to increase the idea of giving and create accountable ways in which businesses and individuals can give through philanthropy," Patrick added. "Additionally, [we are] advocating at all government levels for them to seek out areas within their own budgets to be able to fund needs which are identified by the community."

Patrick was instrumental in creating this program. "I was able to support the team to adjust their initial overall design and create elements that helped fit everything together - not just through the initial concept, but looking forward to how we're going to manage all these pieces together," he explained.

His secret to success? "We're not just contracting officers, we're business advisers," Patrick shared. "I am not an expert in Democracy and Governance, health or infrastructure. All of these [are] areas where I've worked. So I don't try to get into the technical nuances of what makes a good health program or such.

But what I do know is business processes which brings value to whatever design I'm working on."

As such, Patrick suggested that the Mission build in flexibility to the awards. "We know we'll need to pivot, to change, so building into the actual instruments certain flexibilities so we can maneuver and adapt is super important."

SRI LANKA: SPICES AND SUSTAINABILITY

In Sri Lanka, a small farmer's association is producing high quality, organic spices. However, new food safety requirements in other countries have prevented the association's members from directly exporting their products. That's why Frontier Co-op, a Cooperative Development Program (CDP) partner and longtime sourcing partner for the association, is investing in the capacity building, technical assistance, and food safety equipment the association needs to compete in the global spice market. Developing local expertise in food safety compliance is an important part of that process, so Frontier Co-op food safety specialists are currently training local farmers on Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) and Good Handling Practices (GHP), systems for food safety that are widely accepted in international markets, for cinnamon, clove, nutmeg and black pepper. Frontier Co-op and the association will also partner to establish a certified organic processing facility, so that the farmers' spices can be ground and sterilized inhouse. Since both organizations are committed to environmental stewardship, the facility will utilize modern and energy-efficient equipment and have recycling and composting capabilities.

Once operational, the facility will create new employment opportunities which could benefit vulnerable residents in particular, including youth, women, and people living with disabilities. Through this partnership, the association will be more competitive in the global spice industry, while remaining committed to environmental sustainability and also improving the livelihoods of the 3,500 association members, their families and local community.

Smederevo is a Serbian city best known for its steel plant and, sadly, pollution. But now Semederevo's residents are taking action: more than 4,000 citizens have mobilized to measure air pollution. Protok21, a local civil society organization, has a petition to install a so-called "traffic light for air pollution" system which would publicly display air pollution levels, providing crucial information to citizens of Smedevero. Now, with support from the Center for Research, Transparency, and Accountability, a USAID partner, Protok21 is organizing an additional public awareness campaign featuring well-known actors, athletes, musicians, journalists, and more. The campaign, "We need to know," is using these public figures to raise awareness of the impacts of air pollution and is garnering support for the proposed system. Utilizing billboards, traditional media, outdoor public events, and other creative means of communication, the campaign has reached more than 600,000 people in Smederevo and beyond, helping to clear the haze of confusion around air pollution. Now, Protok21 is looking for funding for the proposed system

With a broad array of plant and animal life, the Sierra Gorda Biosphere Reserve is not only one of the most beautiful, but also one of the most biodiverse regions in Mexico. Purísima de Arista is a small, rural community located within the reserve. Given their location and surroundings, the community was seeking to better understand climate change. By partnering with a Peace Corps Volunteer, the community was able to provide training sessions through schools, an important institution for adults and children alike in the community, while also taking steps to mitigate climate change, from planting trees to improving access to clean water. Now, teachers and community members have the training and tools they need to pass along a strong understanding of climate and environmental stewardship, ensuring Purísima de Arista can continue to enjoy their surroundings for years to come.

COVID-19 has impacted and even interrupted education around the world. In Guatemala, a new campaign is ensuring students can safely return to schools. Led by FUNSEPA, a local Guatemalan non-profit, "Safe Return to School" is supporting schools with the tools they need to safely reopen, while also preventing the spread of COVID-19. This unique campaign is a partnership between USAID and the Government of Guatemala, and has also garnered support from the U.S. Department of Defense, the private sector, and more. The campaign's contributions are already evident, as more than half of the public primary schools in the country were able to safely reopen in the past month alone, ensuring students have a safe, healthy environment to continue their education.
