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## **TONGA: WOMEN AND WATER**

In Tonga, climate change has contributed to increasingly unpredictable weather. This poses a challenge to families across the country, as many rely on rainwater for drinking. Bottled water is inaccessible, so families often have to travel long distances just to collect rainwater. In Vaini, a community in the middle of the country, women are at the forefront of creative solutions to this

challenge. A Vaini-based women's group partnered with a Peace Corps Volunteer to install rainwater collection tanks for the community. With a grant through the <u>Small Project Assistance Program</u>, the women's group was able to acquire and install seven new water tanks. Each water tank serves approximately 38 people, meaning the project provided water security to more than 260 community members in total. Community members also received training in tank maintenance and cleaning, ensuring continued access to clean water for years to come.

USAID supported this project through the <u>Small Project Assistance Program</u> (SPA), a longstanding partnership with the Peace Corps.

## CHAMPIONING LOCALLY LED DEVELOPMENT: LUSINE HAKOBYAN

This past year has been an especially challenging time for Armenia. The country was hit hard by COVID-19, and conflict erupted in the Nagorno-Karabakh region in late September of last year. Lusine Hakobyan, Program Specialist from USAID/Armenia, recounts, "Our partners were unable to continue their work in a significant way. The conflict was so personal for so many of us; for a small nation, this was felt by virtually everyone." While these crises may have slowed the Mission's work, they did not deter Lusine and her colleagues from moving forward.

Through <u>Local Works</u>, USAID/Armenia is fostering citizen-led development within diverse Armenian communities. Lusine and the team had initially planned to kick off their engagement with civil society organizations with in-person partner sessions, but facing constraints due to COVID-19, Lusine quickly pivoted to a virtual forum.

"We decided to still have this conversation with local actors, and at that time, no one was as experienced in the virtual forums, we didn't possess the knowledge of virtual tools that we do now." As the Mission's first virtual Local Works workshop, it proved a success. More than 40 participants — including representatives from the communities, civil society, and the government — convened to identify and discuss community priorities, ranging from the short-term needs for food and hygiene supplies and computers for school children, to long-term concerns about the lack of disaster preparedness. The event has informed USAID/Armenia's short-term COVID-19 response efforts, and is contributing to the Mission's future planning as well.

According to Lusine, an important discovery at the workshop was "that the [most] successful efforts to address COVID-19-related problems in the communities entailed close coordination and

"Build relationships and trust -[it] is the key to nuanced understanding of the local collaboration of all actors on the ground," which will inform USAID/Armenia's future activities in support of democratic reforms and economic growth.

Speaking from her firsthand experience, Lusine advises other development professionals to "find opportunities in every challenge, and move forward." That's what she and the Mission have sought to do--despite the challenges they personally have faced in recent months.



#### **KENYA:** COOPERATIVES AND WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

In Kenya, a new study conducted by the <u>U.S. Overseas Cooperative Development Council</u>, a <u>Cooperative Development Program</u> (CDP) partner, highlights the role of cooperatives in empowering women across the country.

The study found that cooperatives are providing significant economic and social advantages to women in Kenya. Although women are generally underrepresented in Kenyan cooperatives, 99% of women cooperative members believe that their membership positively impacts their economic status.

In fact, the study found that women who belong to cooperatives have 35% higher incomes than women who are not members. The women surveyed also reported that they benefit from services provided by their cooperatives, such as improved access to financial services, markets,






These findings suggest that increasing the membership and voice of women within cooperatives could greatly enhance their economic opportunities in Kenya. Read the full report.

#### **NEPAL: USING DATA TO DRIVE INCLUSION**

In Nepal, <u>Local Works</u> is using data to support inclusion. Working with a local research firm, USAID conducted an assessment of social vulnerability and marginalization, including factors like gender and sexual orientation. This was cross-referenced with other risks, including natural disasters, poverty, and the COVID-19 pandemic, to create a comprehensive view of the challenges that individuals and communities are facing.

The analysis found that gender was one of the most important factors, with "the less economic, political, and cultural power that women and gender minorities have before an event, the greater their suffering during and in the event's aftermath."

USAID/Nepal created a geospatial view of the findings, which it will use this to inform programming moving forward.
