The Journey to Self-Reliance Begins with Locally Led Development

As USAID's flagship locally led development programming, <u>Local Works</u> provides five-year discretionary funding to USAID Missions that are awarded through an annual competition. This year, the <u>Office of Local Sustainability</u> selected eight Missions to join the program:

- USAID/Eastern and Southern Caribbean will work to improve the development of underserved communities by implementing citizen-led approaches that address the communities' needs, identifying gaps in resources, and clearly outlining priorities for development.
- **USAID/Guinea** will bring together a coalition of local actors to manage a training, apprenticeship, and grants program to support young entrepreneurs as they establish new businesses that will improve local food security.
- **USAID/India** will work to educate, advocate, and engage networks of local champions and organizations dedicated to improving air quality into a cohesive, strategic, and action-oriented movement to reduce air pollution in up to four cities in India.
- **USAID/Kyrgyz Republic** will improve the health of rural Kyrgystanis by empowering local communities to play an essential role in determining the services they need, while strengthening the government's ability to provide responsive and effective social and behavior change communication and health services to its citizens.
- **USAID/Pakistan** will pilot locally led approaches to enhance community cohesion and mitigate social intolerance to counter violent extremism in Pakistan.
- USAID/Sierra Leone will source locally led solutions to reduce the prevalence of female genital mutilation (FGM) while maintaining cultural integrity by partnering with local organizations to identify the drivers of FGM across the country, and piloting locally led interventions to reduce its prevalence.
- **USAID/South Africa** will facilitate improvements in collaborative planning, community engagement, local ownership, and trauma-informed approaches to deepen and sustain the impact of private sector investments in renewable energy companies. USAID will elevate the role of communities from beneficiaries to crucial stakeholders and ensure that the private sector and the government treat them as such.
- **USAID/Turkmenistan** will work to improve its livestock sector by applying locally driven, market-oriented, and affordable solutions to increase income for farmers, service providers, and entrepreneurs.



UKRAINE: LEADING WITH LOCAL OWNERSHIP DURING COVID-19

Smila is a mid-sized town in central Ukraine with a sizable youth population. Pre-pandemic, the Smila Town Center for Social Services, a civil society organization called Progressive Youth+, and a Peace Corps Volunteer (PCV) collaborated to support a group of young Smila residents who had been meeting sporadically with limited access to space. Through the <u>Small Project</u> <u>Assistance Program</u> (SPA), "Progressive Youth" secured meeting space, training from USAID and the Peace Corps, and more.

As the pandemic and the evacuation of PCVs impacted SPA activities, the local champions forged ahead: youth mentors continued to engage community volunteers virtually through <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Instagram</u>. Once quarantine restrictions were eased, they resumed in-person operations and even secured local funding sources to revamp the youth space. The Progressive Youth have been so successful that last month, it was profiled by a local TV station, Smila TV, in a <u>10-minute segment</u> highlighting the organization's hard work and vision for marginalized youth in Smila.

In Kenya, cooperatives are a force! It is estimated that <u>approximately 80% of the population</u> derives its income either directly or indirectly from cooperative businesses. Through USAID's <u>Cooperative Development Program</u> (CDP), the <u>National Cooperative Business Association</u> (NCBA CLUSA), the <u>World Council of Credit Unions</u> (WOCCU), and non-governmental organization (NGO) <u>Global Communities</u> are working together to boost the country's response to COVID-19. At the national level, these partners are supporting the critical work of the Kenyan government by using cooperative networks to track and distribute key information on COVID-19. At the regional and local level, CDP is supporting a local dairy cooperative in Nandi County with its COVID-19 response. Six female cooperative members are taking the lead by educating children on symptoms, proper handwashing, and social distancing. These women also created a communications platform to disseminate information from the Ministry of Health and provide COVID-19-specific financial advice to borrowers from an affiliated savings and credit cooperative.

The <u>Office of Local Sustainability</u>'s <u>CDP</u> is expanding its activities into Ecuador and Senegal this year, bringing the total number of CDP countries to 17! In Ecuador, implementing partner <u>NCBA</u> <u>CLUSA</u> will assess the country's cooperative law and regulation and make policy recommendations for a more favorable environment for cooperatives and credit unions.

In Senegal, implementing partner <u>WOCCU</u> will strengthen a regional association of credit unions to provide improved financial products to small and medium enterprises.
