


# Early Recovery, Risk Reduction, and Resilience

Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance – West Africa

## **REGIONAL SUMMARY**

- In FY 2023, USAID's Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (USAID/BHA) provided more than \$69.5 million to partner organizations in West Africa conducting early recovery, risk reduction, and resilience (ER4) activities in five countries and throughout the region. USAID/BHA funding addressed the impact of protracted complex emergencies, food insecurity, and climatic shocks, including floods and recurrent drought, on vulnerable populations.
- Multi-year Resilience Food Security Activities (RFSAs) continued to bolster food security and local resilience in the Central Sahel—a region comprising Burkina Faso, Mali, and Niger—through multi-sector interventions during FY 2023. The USAID/BHA-supported Resilience in the Sahel Enhanced (RISE II) program includes RFSA programs in Burkina Faso and Niger aiming to foster more effective governance, improve health outcomes, increase access to water and other natural resources, promote economic



development, and empower women and young people to be a force for positive change in their communities.

• In Niger, USAID/BHA provided nearly \$45 million in FY 2023 funding to three international nongovernmental organization (INGO) partners and the UN World Food Program (WFP) to continue to implement multi-year activities designed to sustainably improve food security, nutrition, and resilience among vulnerable populations by supporting agriculture, livelihoods, maternal and child health care, and women's empowerment.

## **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

#### Combatting Malnutrition and Improving WASH in Burkina Faso

USAID/BHA partner ACDI/VOCA continued its Victory Against Malnutrition Plus initiative (ViMPlus), a sevenyear RFSA launched in 2018 to enhance community resilience to recurrent shocks, improve food and nutrition security, and strengthen the adaptive capacities of at-risk communities in Burkina Faso's Centre-Nord Region. ViMPlus—launched as part of the RISE II program—implemented several annual community investment plans and disaster risk management plans during FY 2023. Nearly 150 local community organizations mobilized more than \$61,000 in participatory financing to implement community projects focused on land and water management, as well as improving civic participation and governance. Additionally, displaced persons and other vulnerable households received interventions focused on livestock production and other income-generating activities. In FY 2023, ViMPlus also reached more than 27,300 individuals with improved health, nutrition, and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services. This included the adoption of optimal infant and young child feeding practices and preventative and antenatal care for pregnant women, as well as early screening for malnutrition and referrals to health centers for treatment.

#### Supporting Food Security and Resilience to Shocks in Niger

USAID/BHA continued to support partner Catholic Relief Services (CRS) with \$14.7 million toward the RISE II Girma project during FY 2023 to strengthen food and nutrition security in Niger's Zinder Region. During the program's lifespan from the beginning of FY 2019 to the end of FY 2023, CRS reached more than 800,000 people with program interventions, including water infrastructure projects to provide safe drinking water, a pilot project—involving 40 local masons—to promote the use of modern latrines, and partnering with a seed company to distribute more than 5 metric tons (MT) of improved seeds to village markets.

USAID/BHA delivered nearly \$11.7 million in FY 2023 support to Save the Children Federation (SCF) to continue implementing the Wadata project, a seven-year RISE II RFSA program aimed at improving food security in Zinder by increasing community capacities, food access, and productive assets. During the fiscal year, the project worked with community groups and local organizations to build community governance capacity and increase the number of women and young people in positions of responsibility. Wadata supported sustainable natural resource management through activities to establish resource management committees, mobilize community financial contributions toward water service improvement plans, and rehabilitate degraded pastoral lands. Additionally, SCF helped develop entrepreneurial projects, increase earnings from diversified livelihoods, and promote community savings and loan groups—particularly for women and youth—to address gender inequality and reduce barriers to lead hygiene, nutrition, and reproductive health awareness sessions to encourage the consumption of varied foods and to bolster latrine usage, reaching more than 7,000 participants across approximately 270 villages throughout the fiscal year.

During FY 2023, USAID/BHA partner CARE reached nearly 95,000 people through the continued implementation of the Hamzari project, a multi-sector RISE II program to enhance livelihoods, improve nutrition outcomes, and expand access to WASH services while promoting gender equality in Niger's Maradi Region. With USAID/BHA support, the program supported the creation of more than 1,700 Village Savings and Loan Association groups, which enhance food security and strengthen the resilience of families and communities to shocks. Hamzari activities include improving access to credit, increasing access to grains during the lean season, and utilizing a livestock loan program informed by a tradition known as *habbanaye*, the practice of loaning livestock to someone in need until the animal reproduces. Also, in FY 2023, the Hamzari project facilitated the

establishment of 25 self-governing warrantage networks composed of approximately 140 cereal banks. The cereal banks replenished a stock of more than 400 MT of millet in three communes in Maradi, enabling adequate grain storage and contributing to the better preservation of crops and household food supply management.

USAID/BHA also provided \$12 million to WFP in FY 2023 to support activities that strengthen the resilience of crisis-affected households across Niger. Approximately 250,000 people received unconditional cash transfers and benefited from activities to enhance agricultural production.

### Improving Food Security and Nutrition Outcomes in Mali

USAID/BHA provided more than \$11.5 million in FY 2023 funding to SCF to implement Albarka, a project aimed at stabilizing and strengthening food security and resilience among at-risk communities in central and northern Mali, including those affected by conflict. SCF continued to foster community self-sufficiency during the fiscal

year by empowering youth to drive economic and social development, promoting improved agricultural practices, and supporting community-driven approaches to natural resource management. The INGO provided food and nutrition assistance to prevent and treat acute malnutrition and bolstered access to health and WASH services, including access to safe drinking water. Additionally, SCF continued to expand the mother-to-mother approach to promote best practices for infant and young child feeding; more than 1,800 support groups—reaching nearly 27,000 pregnant and lactating women—had been established by mid-FY 2023.

Since 2016, the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) has supported

Nigeria's National Emergency Management Agency and various state emergency management agencies through USAID/BHA. USAID/BHA more than doubled its support to the USFS in FY 2023 as part of a multi-year disaster management program to enhance the Government of Nigeria's response and coordination systems. The USFS continued to provide technical assistance for the development and review of emergency management policies, as well as training for state and national emergency management staff members on emergency operation centers, incident command, and multi-agency coordination systems to improve disaster risk management. According to the USFS, USAID/BHA support has improved the Government of Nigeria's ability to effectively coordinate and respond to shocks, such as floods throughout Nigeria's 2023 rainy season.
