INDICATOR DESCRIPTION	
<p>Definition(s): Child protection services: The full range of individual and community-based child protection services designed to reduce and minimize the risk that children and adolescents have to exploitation and abuse during an emergency. Activities can include but are not limited to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Child protection case management, • Alternative and foster care, • Parenting courses, • Safe spaces for children to play and learn, • Family tracing and reunification, • Reintegration for children associated with armed groups, • Psychosocial support, • The establishment of child protection community mechanisms, and • Training in child protection issues. <p>Child protection issues can vary depending on the context, but in general refer to protection from any forms of abuse, neglect, exploitation, and violence affecting children. Participating in child protection activities involves more than one-time casual exposure activities designed to improve the protective environment for children. Activities should be designed around an articulated objective and participation defined per activity to reflect the anticipated exposure intended to lead to the desired program results.</p>

INDICATOR DESCRIPTION	
<p>Definition(s): Sense of safety: A reasonable age- and circumstance-appropriate level of comfort and a lack of fear in surroundings (i.e., places or individuals in an environment).</p> <p>Sense of well-being: A general sense of comfort, trust, health, mental/psychosocial stability and functionality, and freedom from abuse, neglect, exploitation, or violence. The definition of well-being should be locally validated.</p>	
<p>Numerator: Number of children whose responses on cross-culturally validated scales, (or age- and situation-appropriate questions) show an improvement in children’s sense of safety or well-being across two evaluations (e.g., approximately three to six months apart)</p>	
<p>Denominator: Total number of children included in the survey or assessment activity</p>	
<p>Unit of Measure: Percentage</p>	
<p>Disaggregated by: Sex Age</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • under five • 5-9 • 10-14 • 15-19 • 20-49 • 50+ 	
<p>Suggested Data Collection Method: A sense of safety or well-being can be measured through indirect questions designed to elicit responses that can be quantified on scales such as 1-5 or 1-7. This can be measured with</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Psychometric scales, validated within the local culture, that measure, for example, improvement in well-being; 2. Observations of child’s play or interaction with peers or adults that provide quantifiable measures of, for example, abnormal reluctance to pursue usual activities or an expressed fear of seemingly ordinary things; and 3. Children’s narratives that explain their feelings compared to the pre-intervention time period.

Indicator: Number of individuals accessing GBV response services	
INDICATOR DESCRIPTION	
<p>Definition(s): Accessing GBV response activities involves individuals utilizing services including service centers, action planning, group-based support activities, outreach, case management, or any other service that is responding to a need. These activities can be accessible to and relevant for any individual. This includes but is not limited to survivors of GBV. This can also include those at risk of GBV, but who have not been exposed to any incident of GBV. Activities should be designed around an articulated objective and participation defined per activity to reflect the anticipated exposure intended to lead to the desired program results.</p>

Definition(s): This indicator measures the percent of GBV survivors who are able to access any services available to GBV survivors post-incident. It can include GBV survivors accessing case management services, individual or group-based counseling, or referrals to health or legal support.	
Numerator: Number of GBV survivors who choose to access or are referred to survivor-based support or services	
Denominator: Total number of GBV survivors who report to program staff	
Unit of Measure: Percentage (both numerator and denominator must be counted)	
Disaggregated by: Sex Age <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Under five • 5-9 • 10-14 • 15-19

<p>Definition(s): Risk mitigation activities can include both individual and community-based interventions such as</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Safety audits and dissemination of their findings, • Establishment of community-based safety groups, • Distribution of appropriate risk mitigation material support, • GBV-training, and • Awareness-raising among community members of GBV support services. 	
Numerator: Number of targeted members of the community or population participating in GBV prevention or risk mitigation activities

<p>Definition(s): Participating in psychosocial activities involves more than one-time casual exposure activities designed to improve the psychosocial well-being. Activities should be designed around an articulated objective and participation defined per activity to reflect the anticipated exposure intended to lead to the desired program results.</p> <p>Psychosocial support: Programs and activities that builds a community's social and psychological resiliency to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Survive extreme shock and exposure to traumatic events, • Overcome its impact, and • Strengthen competencies in dealing with recurring events. <p>Activities may support strengthening positive coping strategies which become critically important when dealing with the loss of life, losing family members, loss of property, loss of community ties, and other resulting stressors.</p>

<p>Definition(s): Total number of people trained according to standard protection guides for humanitarian agencies or other recognized protocol, who are responsible for addressing protection issues over the period of the program. Protection coordination activities can include</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Protection information gathering and dissemination, • Assistance in the development of referral systems, • Advocating to government officials, • Organizing sensitization campaigns, • Training humanitarian workers, and • Tracking/mapping protection initiatives. 	
<p>Numerator: The number of individuals who are trained to address protection coordination, advocacy, and/or information activities according to an established protocol, guideline, or framework.</p> <p>Count an individual if they are trained with USAID/OFDA funding/support and subsequently work or volunteer either part-time or full-time to respond to, provide referrals, and/or assist with protection coordination, advocacy, or information activities.</p>
